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Introduction

Central Baptist School was founded as a ministry of the Central Baptist Church in 1962 by Dr. C. R. Williams. The school is dedicated to the training of boys and girls spiritually as well as academically to serve our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. All school policies are determined and supervised by the Central Baptist Church.

SCHOOL VERSE

"Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6

MISSION STATEMENT

The purpose of Central Baptist School is to equip Christian students spiritually, academically, physically, and socially through encouragement, discipline, and by example so that they may become more like our Saviour and strong, effective laborers for His service (Luke 2:52, Matthew 9:37-38). Our motives are to win lost students to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, to teach saved students the convictions and standards held by the Central Baptist Church, and to give an education comparable to that offered locally.

CHRISTIAN PHILOSOPHY OF EDUCATION

Central Baptist School holds that the Bible is the infallible, divine Word of God and that salvation by faith in Christ is the initial step in the Christian life. The Bible clearly states that spiritual growth into the image of Christ (Romans 8:29) is the work of the Holy Spirit (II Corinthians 3:18). This growth begins with the initial act of saving faith and continues throughout life. The Holy Spirit makes the Christian conscious of Biblical instruction for a holy life which fulfills both God's moral law and high law of love (Matthew 22:37-39; Romans 13:8-10; Galatians 5:14). The result is a life consecrated unto God and separated from the world.

It is therefore the spiritual objective of Central Baptist School to provide an environment conducive to the spiritual growth and development of young people who are not yet mature Christians. All of the activities of the Christian must be subordinated to the glory of God who indwells us (I Corinthians 8:9,12,13; 10:32). The Christian will endeavor to avoid practices which cause the loss of sensitivity to the spiritual needs of the world and loss of the Christian's physical, mental, or spiritual well-being

(I Corinthians 9:27). A standard of conduct based on the following Biblical imperatives is necessary to provide such an environment.

To accomplish our objective, Central Baptist School will seek:

1. To teach the Bible as God's inspired Word and to foster attitudes of love and respect toward it. To teach the basic doctrines of the Bible.
2. To lead the pupil to a decision of confessing Christ as Saviour and Lord.
3. To foster a desire to know and obey the will of God as revealed in the Scriptures.
4. To equip the student to carry out the will of God daily.
5. To impart an understanding of each Christian's place in the church and his obligation to obey the Great Commission in spreading the Gospel of Christ.
6. To develop the mind of Christ toward Godliness and sin and to teach the student how to have victory over sin.
7. To encourage the development of self-discipline and responsibility in the student based on respect for and submission to God and all other authority.
8. To help the student develop for himself a Christian world view by integrating life and studies with the Bible.

A sense of the need for spiritual growth in light of our objective has led Central Baptist School to adopt the following standards which we believe are conducive to the environment that will best promote the spiritual welfare of the student. **The school therefore expects each student, whether at school, home, or elsewhere, to**

1. Maintain Christian standards in courtesy, kindness, morality, and honesty.
2. Refrain from swearing, indecent language, smoking, drinking alcoholic beverages, drug abuse, gambling, dancing, viewing R-rated or X-rated movies, listening to rock and roll, country, or so called "Christian" rock music, and immodest dress.

The preceding list is by no means exhaustive. Central Baptist School believes, however, that these activities are forms of conduct which are detrimental to the standards established as its objective. Students are expected to abide by these standards throughout their enrollment at Central Baptist School.

In this atmosphere of definite and positive Christian standards of conduct, good scholastic planning, and intimate, personal interest between faculty and student, there is a fine opportunity for development of strong Christian character.

CHURCH AFFILIATION

Students and parents are expected to belong to and attend regularly a Bible-believing church. Central Baptist School teaches the beliefs and convictions of the Central Baptist Church.

STATEMENT OF FAITH

Without apology, Central Baptist School holds to the statement of faith and belief of the Central Baptist Church of Hattiesburg, Mississippi. (The King James Version 1611 is the only accepted Bible in Central Baptist School.)

WE BELIEVE in the verbal, plenary inspiration and authority of the Scriptures (I Timothy 3:16)

WE BELIEVE that the Bible reveals God, the fall of man, the way of salvation, and God's plan and purpose for the ages. (Romans 5:6-12)

WE BELIEVE in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. (Matthew 28:19)

WE BELIEVE in the deity and the virgin birth of Jesus Christ. (Matthew 1:20-21)

WE BELIEVE that salvation is by grace plus nothing and minus nothing. The conditions of salvation are repentance and faith. (Ephesians 2:8-9)

WE BELIEVE that men are justified by faith alone and are accounted righteous before God only through the merit of our LORD and Saviour Jesus Christ. Justification establishes an eternal relationship that can never be broken. (Romans 5:1-2)

WE BELIEVE in the visible, personal, and pre-millennial return of Jesus Christ. (I Thessalonians 4:14-18; II Thessalonians 2:1-5)

WE BELIEVE the rapture of the church will be before the tribulation period.

WE BELIEVE in a literal Heaven and a literal Hell. (I Thessalonians 4:14-18)

WE BELIEVE that prayer is vitally important to undergird the oneness we have in Christ as a Central Baptist School family.

WE BELIEVE parents are the primary educators of their children, spiritually, academically, physically, and socially.

WE BELIEVE that the Bible and religious training are a part of every aspect of the Christian school program.

ACADEMIC AWARDS

Valedictorian—highest grade point average

Salutatorian—2nd highest grade point average

GUIDELINES FOR THESE AWARDS:

1. Two years in attendance at CBS
2. Based on grade point average (4 point scale) (must have 3.0 or better)
3. Semester grades averaged from grades 9 through 12

ACCREDITATION

Accreditation by a state governmental agency is an administrative mechanism designed as an attempt to attain uniform education for all children in governmental schools. It was established as a governmental means of causing local public school districts to meet what the state educational agencies determined to be minimum academic and facility standards for government schools. Accreditation teams therefore investigate and approve or disapprove according to the criteria developed by secular educational administrators who may not be Christian.

Accreditation of a private Christian school is not necessary for a graduate of the school to enroll in a college or university. Registrars of such institutions are interested in the academic merits of individual students, not in the name of their school of graduation. Thus, they evaluate each applicant's aptitude through nationally standardized tests.

Each student is encouraged to take the ACT throughout 10th-12th grades. All seniors will be required to take the ACT.

*Even though a student may have 24 credits, he/she may have to repeat the senior year if all the requirements for the core curriculum have not been met.

HOMEWORK

Homework is an integral part of a child's school program. Therefore, it is expected that each child complete homework assignments on time. Homework is given for several reasons.

1. For reinforcement: We believe that most students require adequate review to master material essential to their educational process.
2. For practice: Following classroom explanation, illustration, and review of new work, homework is given so that the material will be mastered.
3. For remedial activity: As instruction progresses, various weak points in a student's grasp of a subject become evident. Homework following instruction is given to overcome such difficulties.
4. For special projects: Book reports, compositions, special research assignments, and projects are some of the activities that are frequently the subject of homework attention.

Students can expect some homework in each grade level. Most students will find that they will be given sufficient time at school to complete some of their assignments; however, if a student is not diligent at completing his required assignments, he may find his homework load quite heavy.

If incomplete homework is a continual problem, the student may receive detention or other corrective measures. If a parent has questions about homework or some other problem, he should contact the teacher or the school office.

We ask cooperation of parents to ensure that students are given adequate time and a conducive study environment. Approximate time allotments per weeknight are as follows:

Grades 1-2	10-20 minutes
Grades 3-4	30-40 minutes
Grades 5-6	60 minutes
Grades 7-12	90 minutes

HONOR ROLL

Each 9 weeks an honor roll is posted. The following determine the different honor rolls:

A honor roll — All A's (may have one "B")

B honor roll — All A's and B's (may have one "C" if they have at least one "A")

RETENTION — K-8th Grade

Our school policy for retention is as follows:

An "F" in any two core subjects (Bible, Language, Math, Reading, Science, History) will result in retention at the present grade level.

TESTS AND EXAMS — 7th-12th Grade

Semester and final exams will be given in most classes. These exams are cumulative and make up an important part of the student's grade. Semester exam schedules will be given to the students in advance. Secondary students who have achieved an "A" average will not be required to take the final at the end of the year.

Dress Code

A part of Christian training is learning to dress appropriately for specific occasions. When attending church, recitals, special programs, or other activities, a Christian should be properly dressed. Central Baptist School wants students who are concerned about their modesty and neatness, both at school and away from school, and expects its students to dress accordingly at all times.

Students must wear the CBS uniform at all times while at school, unless permission is given by the principal. The dress code is also in effect on school property and at any after-school activity, including ball games played at home or away. The administration reserves the right to be the final judge of what is appropriate for any school activity.

We respectfully request that parents assist the school by insuring conformity to the following guidelines on behalf of their children and themselves when participating in or attending school activities. These standards have been established in the interest of modesty, Christian appearance, and behavior and are aimed at contributing to a respectful school atmosphere.

UNIFORMS

All uniforms must be purchased from Parker Uniform Company.

Girls

- Shirts - royal blue from Parker Uniform Company
- Khaki Skirts - Parker Uniform Company Item # 5214, 5254, 5271, and 5359
 - Hemlines must be to the bottom of the knee.
 - Skirts must touch the ground in a kneeling position.
 - Skirts must be without designs, embroidery, etc. on the fabric.
- Shoes and Socks - K-6th grade
 - Shoes must be neat and clean, conservative tennis shoes, casual shoes or dress shoes. Backless shoes of any type are not permitted.
 - Crocs, flip-flops, sandals, or open-toed shoes are not permitted.
 - Boots, Heelies, light-ups, jellies or character shoes are not permitted.
 - Solid white bobbie socks, knee socks or tights are permitted. (no leggings or leg warmers)

- Shoes and Hosiery - 7th-12th grade

- Nylon shades must be white, off-white, or of a natural skin color.
- Shoes must be black or brown flats or low heels no higher than 1 inch. Backless shoes of any type are not permitted.
- Socks must be no-show and a natural skin color. Bright colors are not permitted.
- Crocs, flip-flops, sandals, boots, open-toed shoes, or excessively-decorated shoes are not permitted.
- Tennis shoes may only be worn during physical education.

- Hair

- Hair must be neat and clean. Fad hairdos, cuts, or colors are not permitted. Extreme designs, partially- shaved patches, or completely shaven heads are not permitted.

- Other

- Only the top button of the shirt may be unbuttoned.
- Only one earring in each ear is permitted and the earring must be on the ear lobe.
- Earrings must be nickel-size or smaller.
- Make-up must be in good taste. Girls below the 7th grade may not wear make-up.
- Hair may not be dyed to an unnatural color.
- Nails and nail polish must be conservative. Girls below the 7th grade may not wear press on or acrylic nails.
- Only white undershirts may be seen at the front collar. Colored undershirts are not permitted to be seen. Undershirts are not permitted to hang out from below the uniform shirt.
- Hoodies, pullovers, and bright, gaudy jackets are not permitted.
- Long sleeve shirts under the short sleeve uniform shirts are not permitted. Long sleeve uniform shirts may be purchased at Parker Uniform Company.

Boys

- Shirts - royal blue from Parker Uniform Company
- Khaki Pants - Parker Uniform Company Item # 60040, 60050, 60060, 60070, 60090, 60180, and 60430 or Academy Sports (Austin Brand)
- Socks, Belts, and Shoes
 - Belts and socks must be worn every day. Exception: pants without belt loops (kindergarten only)
 - Socks, belts, and shoes should match the student's outfit.
 - Shoes must be black or brown casual shoes, or black or brown dress shoes. Neat, clean tennis shoes may be worn only in K-6th grade. 7th-12th grade students may wear tennis shoes only during physical education.
 - Boots, Heelies, light-ups, or character shoes are not permitted.
 - Crocs, flip-flops, or sandals are not permitted.
- Hair
 - Boys' hair must be clean and neatly cut. The hair should not be shaggy or bushy, may not touch the eyebrows in the front, nor the collar of the shirt in the back, nor the ears. Tails, "punk" or "faddish" haircuts are not permitted. Line cuts in the hair, shaved portions, "bowl cuts," hair dyed with peroxide, or any other radical styles or fashions are not permitted.
- Other
 - Shirts must be tucked in at all times.
 - Only the top button of the shirt may be unbuttoned.
 - Earrings, necklaces, or bracelets are not permitted.
 - Hoodies, pullovers, and bright, gaudy jackets are not permitted.
 - Long sleeve shirts under the short sleeve uniform shirts are not permitted. Long sleeve uniform shirts may be purchased at Parker Uniform Company.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION UNIFORMS - 7th-12th grade

Girls must wear **royal blue, navy blue, black or gray** culottes/shorts and a CBS t-shirt (purchased from the school office) for physical education. The culottes/shorts must be baggy and come to the knee.

Boys must wear **royal blue, navy blue, black or gray** nylon warm-up pants or shorts and a CBS t-shirt (purchased from the school office). Warm-up pants with snaps along the side are not permitted; however, the pants may have zippers. Pants and shorts must be baggy and come to the knee. No denim jeans or shorts are permitted.

GENERAL

There are times in the school year when our uniforms will not be practical. These times will include banquets, ballgames, and funerals. For these times, certain standards should still be followed. No student should dress out of dress code without the principal's permission. The following apply to non-uniform apparel:

1. Dresses or skirts with slits above the bottom of the knee are not permitted.
2. The front neckline on a top may not come lower than three fingers from the bottom of the neck. The back neckline on a top may not come lower than four fingers from the bottom of the neck.
3. Tight-fitting clothing is not permitted.
4. Tops must have some sort of sleeve. Cap sleeves are permitted.
5. Tops and skirts that show the midriff are not permitted.
6. Apparel promoting other schools is not permitted.
7. A CBS faculty member must approve all banquet and formal dresses. This includes dresses of any non-CBS student who will be attending a school-sponsored event.

DRESS CODE ENFORCEMENT

A hair slip will be issued to any elementary student violating the hair code. The student's hair violation is to be corrected within 3 days in order for the student to be allowed to attend classes.

Any student violating the dress code rules will be sent to the office and will be asked to phone his/her parents to ask them to bring proper attire so that he/she may change before returning to class.

Discipline

Our purpose in student discipline is to provide a foundation and to produce the character of Christ through the implementation of biblical principles of correction. **Standards of discipline will help a student maintain the conviction of his parents' hearts. If the parent does not share the convictions of the school regarding separation from ungodly conduct, he would be wise not to enroll the child(ren) in the school because such a parent cannot help support standards related to issues for which he has no personal conviction.**

Central Baptist School's discipline policies can best be described in two applications: behavioral discipline and character development.

- Behavioral discipline provides lessons for students both now and for the future. Lessons of behavioral discipline include:
 1. Teaching the fear of the Lord (Proverbs 1:5-7)
 2. Teaching students to make right decisions and to stand alone for righteousness (Proverbs 1:10-19, 29-33)
 3. Teaching God's laws of cause and effect (Galatians 6:7-8; Deuteronomy 11:26-28)
 4. Teaching restitution for offenses (Matthew 5:23-24; 18:15)
- Character development is necessary for a student to achieve spiritual leadership ability. One of our chief goals at CBS is to develop Christian character within each student. This will be evidenced largely by a child's outward behavior whether he be at home, school, or elsewhere. An undisciplined life is largely an unproductive life. Each student will be challenged to accept responsibility for his assignments, and each student will be expected to accomplish his work promptly and efficiently. This expectation prepares him for a life of stewardship and discernment. Students are reminded that, "Whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." (I Corinthians 10:31)

When a child's attitude is not in accord with school policies or principles, the child will be placed on probation and parents will be called for a conference. If the administration feels the situation has not changed within two weeks, parents will be asked to withdraw the child.

When a teacher thinks a problem warrants more drastic action than he or she is allowed to administer, the child will then be referred to the principal. The principal has, among other options, the authority to administer corporal discipline, give detentions, suspend, or expel. Students and parents should note that attending CBS is a privilege, not a right.

This school is dedicated to the training of children in programs of study, activity, and living that is Christ-centered. Our staff maintains standards of behavior through kindness, love, and genuine regard for the students. However, when disciplinary action becomes necessary, it is firmly carried out, tempered by good judgment and understanding.

DEMERITS — 7th-12th Grade

The demerit system is designed to give the student and parents an objective picture of the student's general behavior. Demerits are accrued on a semester basis. An accumulation of 125 demerits before the final ten school days of a semester will result in automatic expulsion and loss of credit. If the 125th demerit is earned within the final 10 school days of a semester, the student is not expelled but begins the next semester with 50 demerits. Parents will be notified about demerit accumulation as follows:

25 demerits	Letter sent home
50 demerits	Letter sent home, one-day suspension
75 demerits	Letter sent home, two-days suspension
100 demerits	Letter sent home, three-days suspension
125 demerits	Expulsion

Absences accumulated during suspension will be considered unexcused. Any student who accumulates 100 demerits will have 20 demerits removed if he receives no demerits for a three-week period after earning the 100th demerit. A second suspension will not be given if the student's demerit total exceeds 100 a subsequent time.

CORPORAL DISCIPLINE

Corporal punishment or spanking is a scriptural method of correction and is administered with care at Central Baptist School. It will only be used with the parent's permission on file.

The following guidelines will be followed:

1. Each parent must sign a permission/hold harmless agreement before his or her child can be paddled.
2. Students will be made fully aware of the reason for the spanking. A student who refuses corporal punishment will not be allowed back in class.
3. The parent will be called at home or work.
4. A male staff member (boys) or a female staff member (girls) will administer a maximum of three firm swats with a flat, wooden paddle.
5. The students will not be physically restrained.
6. A staff witness will be present.
7. A written record will be made of the date, the offense, and the name of the correcting administrator and witness.

Spanking may be administered in addition to demerits for serious offenses. Spanking may be used if demerits, detention, etc. fail to remedy the problem.

SUSPENSIONS

Serious infractions of school regulations or repeated offenses may result in suspension. The length of suspension will depend upon the offense. Students on suspension may not attend or participate in any extra-curricular activities (including athletic practices and events) during the time of suspension except by permission from the administrator.

Offenses that can result in immediate suspension are listed below. This list is not meant to be all-inclusive but contains examples of behavior that may result in suspension. Ultimately, the principal decides which offenses will result in suspension.

- fighting
- theft
- cheating
- lying
- destroying school property
- excessive absences
- frequent failure to complete assignments
- disobedience
- insubordination

- open rebellion
- disrespect to a teacher

When a student is to be suspended, the school office will notify the parents stating the reason for suspension and a record of the suspension will be kept in the students' file. The principal may require a conference with the student and his parents before allowing the student to re-enter school.

In school suspension (ISS) may also become necessary. Students serving ISS may not talk, communicate, or associate with other students.

Continuous misconduct that results in more than one suspension may result in expulsion. Expulsion for the remainder of the school year will be mandatory after three suspensions.

EXPULSION

The removal of any student from the school is a serious matter. Situations that bring great discredit upon the school warrant expulsion. Some examples of offenses which may result in expulsion are listed below. This list is not meant to be all-inclusive.

- fighting
- stealing
- use or possession of tobacco, illegal drugs, or alcohol
- continuous misconduct resulting in several suspensions
- any female student found to be pregnant
- any male student found to have fathered a child
- any student found to be sexually active
- any student who marries
- any conviction of criminal activity
- failure to remain consistent in church attendance.

A student who has been expelled may not re-enroll for the current school year but may request enrollment for the following year by submitting a letter to the principal explaining why he should be admitted. (A student and/or parent may submit this letter.)

AFTER-SCHOOL CARE

After-school care supervision begins at 3:30 p.m. and ends at 5:30 p.m. each Monday through Friday that school is in session. After-school care is \$5 per hour per person for all ages. The rate increases to \$5 per 15 minutes after 5:30 p.m.

Those parents participating in after-school care will receive a statement at the first of each month stating the number of hours and cost accrued in the previous month.

ATTENDANCE

Absences

All absences are either excused or unexcused. Reasons for excused absences include illness of the student, death in the family, medical or dental appointments, and administration-approved absences. Work missed during excused absences may be made up for credit if done so within the allotted time. Make-up quizzes and tests will be arranged with the teacher.

Parents should contact the office the morning a student is ill. The student must bring a written, dated excuse from his parents explaining the absence to the school office upon returning to school.

If a student is absent for any reason other than those mentioned above, the absence is unexcused. Each day a student is suspended is an unexcused absence. A zero will be given on quizzes and missed assignments when a student receives an unexcused absence. Tests and exams will be permitted to be made up at the approval of the administration. **Absences totaling up to 20 days, whether excused or unexcused (unless the student has an extended illness) will cause the student to be expelled due to over-absence.** No absences will be permitted during exams, SAT's and special projects.

Parents are encouraged to check their child out of school only if the child is sick, a family emergency occurs, or for a medical or dental appointment. Checking a student out for any other reason constitutes an unexcused absence. A full school day consists of seven hours. Time missed for a partial day will be added together to determine days of absence and counted in the total number of absences per quarter.

Students are responsible for making up quizzes or tests when they are absent. It is the responsibility of the students to arrange a time with their teacher to make-up quizzes or tests. If a test or quiz is scheduled on the day the student returns from an absence, it will be left to the teacher's discretion when that student should take the test or quiz.

Tardies

A student is considered tardy if he is not in his seat when school begins. An accumulation of four tardies will result in one absence on the student's record.

CELL PHONE POLICY

All phones need to be turned in to the office at the beginning of every school day. They may be picked up from the office prior to departure from school. If a cell phone is confiscated from a student during the school day, it must be retrieved from the school office by a parent.

CHILD CUSTODY

The intent of CBS is to abide by existing limitations regarding parental child custody. Parents or students of families who consistently create disharmony or disruption in the daily school routine may be asked to withdraw by the administration.

CLOSED CAMPUS POLICY

1. Students are not to leave campus at any time during school hours without permission from the office.
2. Any student who has the authorization to leave campus must sign the check-out sheet in the school office prior to leaving and again when returning.
3. No student is allowed to leave campus before, during, or after school with another student unless permission is obtained from both students' parents and the office is notified.
4. No student is to go to the church building without specific permission from a member of the school staff.
5. All visitors (prospective students, parents, alumni of Central Baptist School) are to check in at the office upon arrival.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

While it is not the desire of CBS to discriminate against any student, we are faced with the challenge of providing a safe haven for those students entrusted to our care by their parents. Our purpose is to protect our students from exposure to mortal illness.

We recognize also, that CBS with its limited finances is not equipped to physically care for the needs of very ill students or any student with a serious continuing or chronic communicable disease. Therefore, because we are moved with deep sympathy for the sick child, and for the well child, it will be the policy of CBS to deny admission or to require dismissal from the school any child with a serious communicable disease. (If at the time CBS has a Home Study Program, this may be considered as a possibility for retaining the student under our supervision.) The concern is twofold: it is that other students not infected with transmittable diseases not be infected and that the student with the infection to be infected with other diseases transmitted by fellow students or others within the school family.

Children enrolled at CBS or those who seek to enroll at CBS who are diagnosed to be carrying any serious communicable or potentially lethal disease shall be denied admission or dismissed from the school. They will not be permitted to enroll or re-enroll in regular CBS classes until they have been medically diagnosed as no longer carrying the communicable disease.

This policy is to apply to diseases such as, but not limited to, syphilis, gonorrhea, Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS), etc. Students who test positive for antibodies of HIV (Human Immunodeficiency) or who are infected with ARC (Aids Related Complex) are included in this policy.

It is the responsibility of the parent or guardian of a student to inform the school of a student's infection or serious continuing communicable disease upon enrollment (of a new student) or at the time of diagnosis.

In adopting this policy, CBS recognizes that the state of medical knowledge about AIDS and other serious communicable disease is rapidly changing. The school will therefore update the policy statement in light of significant new information on such disease.

Any child found to have head lice will not be allowed to return to school without a release from the Health Department.

COMMUNICATION WITH PARENTS

In order to insure the best possible means of communication, CBS requests that parents cooperate with us in the following areas:

1. If a parent desires to see a teacher, he is to make arrangements ahead of time with the teacher.
2. In the event that a problem is not resolved to the parent's satisfaction after he has discussed the situation with the faculty/staff member directly involved, it is his right and responsibility to contact the administrator for a meeting with both the faculty/staff member and the administrator. In extreme cases, the pastor will be asked to attend the meeting as well.

DRIVING GUIDELINES

Any student desiring to drive to school must strictly adhere to the following guidelines or lose all driving privileges on campus. Any reckless driving or excessive speeding of a vehicle on school grounds will constitute immediate suspension of all driving privileges, as well as the issuance of demerits as listed earlier. As with lockers, all cars are subject to administrative checks while on campus.

All student drivers must:

1. Have a valid Mississippi driver's license
2. Have parental permission and proof of insurance
3. Not transport other CBS students without consent of one of their parents and the passenger's parents
4. Not be alone in a car at any time with the opposite gender except in the case of siblings
5. Park in the designated student parking area
6. Drive carefully and cautiously on campus
7. Not leave campus during school hours unless it is for a medical or dental appointment or they have permission from the administration or a parent.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

1. Participation in extracurricular activities is a privilege and carries certain responsibilities.
2. The student is a representative of the school and therefore his attitude and actions should be glorifying to the Lord.
3. A member of a team or club has an obligation to that group and is to be present at all meetings, practices, etc. unless ill or excused by the administrator, coach, or sponsor.
4. In order to prevent misunderstanding, each member of a team or club may be required to sign an agreement defining his/her rights, responsibilities, and obligations. This agreement will also be signed by the parents.
5. All participating members of a team or group are to ride in school transportation to and from school activities. They may ride with their parents or relatives only with permission from the sponsor.
6. School rules of dress and conduct apply to any school activity.
7. It is not the responsibility of faculty and staff to provide transportation from school to a student's home after an activity. Parents are to arrange for the students to be picked up promptly when the activity is over.
8. Participation in extracurricular activities will involve additional expense for out-of-town trips, meals and, at times, special attire.
9. A student must attend school the day of any activity (athletic event, trip, concert, etc.) in order to participate in that particular activity. Exceptions may only be made by the administration.

Athletics

Athletes must not have an "F" in any core subject for a nine-week grading period. Athletes who fail to meet these requirements will be ineligible to play for the following nine weeks. This includes athletes who fail in the fourth quarter of the year.

Students with major disciplinary violations will be suspended from the team for two games or more. Suspension lengths are subject to the discretion of the administration. During such times athletes may practice but may not participate in the games or travel with the team. Students with continual disciplinary violations will be suspended from these activities for the year.

Athletes may be responsible for purchasing team uniforms. Basketball jerseys are paid for and remain the property of the school. When an athlete accepts the jersey he is responsible to return it in the same condition at the end of the season. Jerseys are to be worn only for school-related functions.

Athletes have to miss several classes during the course of the season. They must make up all work that is missed. An away game may require that the student return to school late in the evening; therefore, allowances must be made for shortened study time. If it is found that practices and schedules hurt a student's grades, it is recommended that the extracurricular sports be given up.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

A more detailed description of financial obligations can be found in the CBS Admissions Packet. The following are general financial guidelines of CBS:

1. Students attending one or more days in a month will owe for the entire month.
2. Graduation fees will be determined by the cost of the cap and gown at the time of graduation.
3. We may have mandatory school-wide fundraisers for students in K5 - 12th grade, and we ask that all parents participate so that we may keep our tuition and fees reasonable. You may choose not to participate in fundraisers and pay the non-participation fee of \$300 per semester or \$600 per year.
4. A 10% discount will be given if total yearly tuition is paid in advance.
5. All charges are due on or before the first of the month. A \$25 late fee will be charged on all accounts not paid by the 10th of each month.
6. A \$40 fee will be charged on all returned checks as well as the \$25 late fee.
7. If an account becomes more than thirty days late, the student will not be allowed to attend classes unless arrangements are agreed to in writing and signed by the parents and the administrator.
8. All lunches and snack items will be billed to the student's account and will be added to the monthly statement.

ILLNESSES

First aid will be administered by teachers or staff members only. We do not give any kind of internal medicine (including aspirin or Tylenol) to any student without written permission from parents. A student taking prescription medicine is to leave the medication with the school secretary.

Any student who is ill must check in with the school office before his parents are contacted. The office will contact the student's parents if it is necessary for him/her to go home.

INCLEMENT WEATHER

Please listen closely to WDAM television and your local radio stations for information on school closures. As a general rule, if Hattiesburg public schools are closed due to inclement weather, Central Baptist School will also be closed.

LOCKERS

Each student in the junior and senior high will be assigned locker and storage space upstairs in the halls and downstairs in the bathrooms. Lockers are to be kept clean at all times and may be periodically inspected. Demerits may be issued for disorderly lockers, inappropriate items, or marked locker faces or locks. Combination locks are assigned before school, and combinations should not be shared to avoid problems and to insure privacy. Lockers must be kept locked at all times. No student is to open another's locker.

LOST AND FOUND

All students should see the school secretary to retrieve lost items at a cost of \$1 per visit. At the end of each quarter, all unclaimed articles will be disposed of at the discretion of the administration. All personal belongings should be labeled and clearly marked with the child's full name whenever possible.

LUNCH ROOM

Students may bring their lunches or may purchase vendor-type food in the lunchroom if available. No monies will be collected from those purchasing lunch items or snack items.

OFFICE

No student is to be in the school office except for official school business. Students are not to wait in the office after school. The telephone in the school office is for official school business only. Students may use the phone only if it is absolutely necessary.

SOCIAL NETWORKING SITES

Students' social networking accounts (i.e. Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc.) must be accessible to church and school staff members who are allowed to monitor throughout the year. This safeguard is to discourage students from posting or saying things that would be contradictory to the standard of discipline in conduct and attitude of CBS as described in the handbook. Anything posted by CBS students (conversations, pictures, music, etc.) that does not conform to the standards of conduct and attitude for CBS students will result in disciplinary action. As listed in the "Christian Philosophy of Education" section of the handbook, the school expects each student, whether at school, home, or elsewhere (online), to live up to the standard of conduct of our school. The administration reserves the right to suspend or close a student's social networking activity and/or site(s). **Parents are strongly encouraged to monitor their student's online activity very closely.**

TELEPHONE MESSAGES

Students are discouraged from making phone calls to home unless there is an emergency (sudden illness or injury), forgotten lunch, or a schedule change. It is requested that parents leave phone messages for their children only if an emergency arises. Classrooms will not be disturbed to notify a student regarding a forgotten lunch or other items. Every attempt will be made to contact the student between class times or at lunch. Items to be delivered to a student should be brought to the school office rather than taken directly to the classroom, as this interrupts the start of the school day or teaching that is in progress. Students should check in the office for any items that parents may drop off for them.

TOYS AT SCHOOL

Students are not to bring toys to school without permission of the teacher. Any toys having the effect or appearance of a weapon are prohibited.

WITHDRAWALS

All withdrawals must go through the school office. Parents are to fill out a withdrawal form stating the reason for withdrawal. All school fees must be paid before the release of school records.

As the school year progresses, it may be necessary to change some rules or add new ones. If a rule is changed, the administration will make every effort possible to inform the parents as well as the students of the change.*
